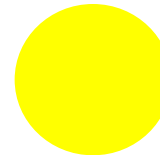

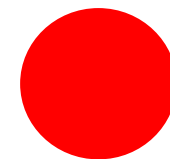

2 Full nomination

One PDF including: a letter of nomination, suggested event date(s) during the next two academic years, lecture title and abstract, speaker CV and bio, evidence of interdisciplinary appeal, and supporting letters from outside the sponsoring department (three for University, six for Messenger).

Due Nov 2, 2026

First Monday in November for fall; second Monday in April for spring.

Approvals stay valid for events up to two years in the future

AI Tools Used by Faculty, Students, Staff

Current State

- Some centrally offered AI tools are available but with limited adoption
 - Microsoft CoPilot Chat (limited capabilities)
 - Claude Code/Cowork through secure token gateway (complex setup)
 - AI tools are already widely purchased by students, faculty, and staff
 - uneven access, lack of common platforms, hidden course fees
 - AI tools enter Cornell through licenses purchased with pcards or personal funds
 - no institutional review of legal terms, privacy guarantees, security, ...
- Current state leads to unequal access, limits visibility and governance, and creates substantial risks for security, privacy, and compliance to both individuals and institution.

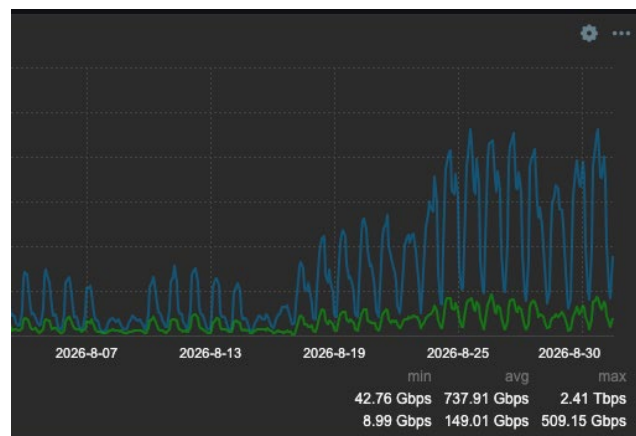
HOW TO UNPLUG?

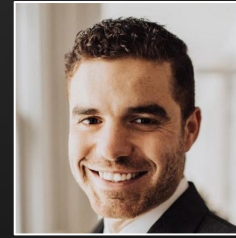

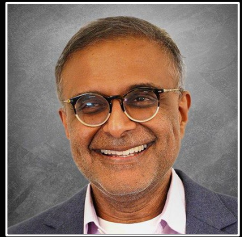

What's New in Revised Code?

1. Updated violation examples including use of unauthorized technology
2. First-time violator warning and workshop option
3. Central reporting tool for violations
4. Inclusion of graduate student work



Accepting Responsibility Initiative

- Warning and workshop for first-time violators
- 1% recidivism in pilot -- 309 referrals, 4 subsequent violations
- Instructor stays educational mode, less adversarial
- Students are engaged in workshops – they all talk, all write
- Used for undergraduate, masters, and PhD students
- Available at Ithaca and Tech campuses



Senators to Departments: Talk About Academic Integrity

- Schedule Faculty Meeting to review slide show (<10 minutes)
- Discuss norms within department for violation penalties
- Identify minor violations for Accepting Responsibility
- Walk through a violation report
- Know your AIHB chair – ask them for guidance

Proposed Faculty Senate Procedure for Committee Referral

Chris B. Schaffer, Dean of Faculty, Chair of the University
Faculty Committee

Committee review can deepen Senate debate

- **More substantive preparation**
 - Committee can investigate evidence, policy implications, and alternatives.
- **Broader consultation**
 - Committee can interview affected faculty, administrators, and others with relevant expertise.
- **Committee can collaborate, condemn, or something in between**
 - Committee is independent; collaborative refinement is the goal when possible
- **Better use of limited Senate time**
 - Focus Senate debate on clear, substantive choices.



Five steps bring matters to Senate debate

1. Submit

- Sponsor brings an issue or resolution to the Dean of Faculty.

2. Refer and set a timeline

- University Faculty Committee (UFC) routes the matter; materials are posted.

3. Review and consult

- Committee gathers input and develops its analysis or response.

4. Return and schedule

- UFC receives the work; final materials are posted for Senate consideration.

5. Present and debate

- Sponsor presents; committee adds analysis; Senate deliberates and decides.



Strategies to mitigate major concerns

- ***Minimize delays: agree on a timeline at referral***
 - Dean of Faculty and committee chair balance urgency and complexity.
- ***No pocket vetoes: matters move forward if deadlines missed***
 - UFC may approve an extension, or the matter advances with the materials available.
- ***Flexibility for urgent matters: allow transparent referral bypass***
 - UFC can advance matter directly to the Senate; justification will be explicit.
- ***Maximize transparency: post materials and invite comments***
 - Post proposals, referral rationale, and sponsor/committee final materials
 - Welcome comments from the Cornell community
